

Jonathan Curedale Calvert was an investment advisor and adventurer who died on August 23, 2018, in San Antonio, Texas. He was born in Cambridge, Massachusetts, and came to Princeton from Exeter Academy. He joined the Cottage Club, majored in History, and wrote his thesis on "Mosby's Partisan Rangers." After graduation, Jonathan was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the U.S. Marine Corps and was deployed overseas to Japan and then Korea. He remained in the reserves until August 1968 when he retired at the rank of Captain. After his military service Jonathan worked in New York and Chicago before moving to Texas to found a securities brokerage firm with his college roommate, Richard "Dick" King. That firm was bought by a regional firm and Jonathan became manager of the firm's San Antonio branch. Later he partnered with Ed Glass and Edward Austin, Jr. to create Glass, Austin & Calvert, one of the first registered investment advisor firms in the region. Jonathan was also a self-described "adventurer" who spent fifty years exploring remote corners of the world and climbed the highest peaks on six of the seven continents. In 2000, he was a member of an expedition that made the first successful crossing of South Georgia island, following the 1916 route of the famous Antarctic explorer Sir Ernest Shackleton. Jonathan is survived by his wife, Elizabeth, his daughters, Blair, Sarah, and Mollie, stepson Edward, and eight grandchildren.
